LYSSAVIRUS IS PREVENTABLE

- > To catch ABLV from a bat you need to have contact with bat saliva onto broken skin or the mucous membranes of the eyes, nose or mouth. This commonly occurs through a bite or a scratch.
- > ABLV can be fatal but immediate medical intervention to receive post-exposure vaccination can prevent the onset of the disease.
- > ABLV is rare in bats but any bat may have the virus.

BATS ARE IMPORTANT

Bats are critically important to the health of our environment. There are two types of bats - Megabats and Microbats.

- Megabats keep our native forests healthy by pollinating and spreading seeds over long distances. They eat fruit and blossoms. Flying Foxes are one type of Megabat and we have 3 species in our region
- Microbats are great pest controllers for farmers and those who don't like to be bitten by mosquitoes and sandflies! They mainly eat insects and the Whitsundays is home to about 30 different species.

MUM & DAD

How to treat a bat bite or scratch!

- 1. Immediately wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water for at least five minutes.
- 2. If available apply an antiseptic with anti-virus action such as povidone-iodine, iodine tincture, aqueous iodine solution or alcohol (ethanol) after washing.
- 3. If bat saliva contacts the eyes, nose or mouth, it is necessary to flush the area thoroughly with water.
- 4. After washing the wound call a Doctor or hospital immediately to discuss being vaccinated for ABLV.
