#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The updated Code of Practice, Care and Rehabilition of Orphaned, Sick or injured protected Animals by Wildlife Care Volunteers is now available.

All members will be receiving a copy either by email or post. Please ensure you read this as it is a Fauna Rescue Carers obligation to adhere to this code.

The committee is still working on more training workshops for members. All carers need to ensure they are up to date with the latest techniques in Wildlife Care.

Sandy has organized HELEN GEORGE, a very seasoned wildlife carer to run a workshop for us on OCT 14<sup>TH</sup> & 15<sup>TH</sup>. The topics for the workshop will be on **MARSUPIALS & ECHIDNAS**.

To book your place please use the tear off slip on the last page.

Baby bird season is not far away now and we are already seeing a few littlies come into care. If you have not already done so, please contact me if you are interested in looking after baby birds. We will be running another Bird Workshop for some who have been unable to attend the others. I will give those interested a call when we organize a date.

Fauna Rescue would like to thank the

Whitsunday Shire Council for the recent funding as part of their community grants.

We were allocated \$2200.00 for the Project Grant, which will help fund our committee member, Di Jessop & her partner Col Forster, who is also a member of Fauna Rescue (both of them are avid bird carers), to attend the National Wildlife Rehabilitation Conference held this year in Darwin. Di & Col will give a presentation for members at one of our meetings, to share all the information they gained at the conference with us.

We also received \$1500.00 from the Whitsunday Shire Council for the Equipment Grant which will go towards the concrete rat wall needed to build the 18m x 4m flight habitat, which has primarily been designed for raptor rehabilitation, but may be used for other bird species (when no raptors are in care of course!!).

I am currently taking names for people who would like to attend the working bee to construct the aviary. Please give me a call or email if you can be of help. Our School & Community Wildlife Education Project is still running. We have booked a talk at one of the Pre-School Centres for September, the Whitsunday Christian College, in conjunction with the PetPep Program (this is the 3rd year we have participated in this) and also a talk to the Refurbishment Committee regarding the Swallows in Proserpine.

If your school or community organization is interested in us doing a presentation on Fauna Rescue and living with Wildlife please give me a call.

We are still looking for **Bat Carers**. Cathie has taken on the job of Bat Co-ordinator again and would like to hear from anyone interested in caring and/or rescuing bats. You will need to be prepared to have your vaccinations against Bat Lyssavirus. Please call Cathie if your would be interested for further details.

Lastly, the Dept of Primary Industries & Fisheries (DPI&F) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) co-operated to produce a joint approach to the investigation of reports of **sickness or deaths in native birds.** 

According to the operational policy developed by the EPA some incidences of sickness and deaths in native birds is reportable. Therefore, please contact me if you do receive sick and/or dead birds so I can contact the appropriate authorities with relevant information if necessary.

We did this for about a week and each time he stayed out for a bit longer. Then it rained and I think it threw him a bit as he did'nt come back that day and he had his first night out. The next day he came back late afternoon for a bottle and a little sweet potato, as he has done every day since.

Last week I was looking out for him to come up for his feed and he bought a friend back with him. It was just wonderful to see them out there, both the same size and the same sex!!! Well we can't win them all. No seriously it was so rewarding to see them together and to know he was mixing with his own kind and free, as they should be.

#### A Remarkable Ringtail, THE SURROGATE MOTHER RINGTAIL



At dusk on New Years Eve during an extremely hot spell I received 2 emergency fauna rescue calls within five minute of one another. One from Hawthorndene near the golf course the other from Belair.

Both concerned people arrived independently at the same time with their boxes with their rescued ringtails. Unrelated patients. I thanked them for c caring and told them they were in safe hands now.

One, an adult female was found under bushes at Hawthorndene with what appeared to be a bro ken back as her back legs were paralysed and the fur and skin was worn off her back legs and feet

from dragging herself around. She had what was a recently healed wound across her hips. How she survived through the intense heat goodness knows as she was unable to climb to find food. I thought I would care for her through the night and decide what to do with her in the morning. I checked her pouch to see if she had any young, , in case there were babies to remove if I decided to have her euthanased. No sign of young and the nipples were inert

The poor thing had survived the ordeal but was weak and dehydrated and made no effort to struggle. She seemed to know it was going to have a chance to survive. The other baby ringtail weighed 65grams was an orphan and only very hungry. I cared for them through the night with sugar water and slowly introduced wombaroo milk.

The following morning the adult female began to regain her strength and didn't mind the applications of Savlon to her wounds. She began to eat grapes and rose buds. I decided to give her a chance and tried massage to her legs and gentle exercise with peddling motions to her legs and massage to her back. This she tolerated and laid on her back while I bicycled her withered back legs. Unbelievably, she made no attempt to bite me. I had had success once before with this method on a juvenile brush tail after the vet told me he would never be able to climb due to a paralysed back leg. After my effort of physiotherapy he began to climb and was able to be released.

The two seemed to take comfort in one another and with in days the adult began washing and toileting the baby, but I became concerned when after a while as the baby ringtail didn't seem interested in the Wombaroo milk, although she seemed to be thriving.

On close observation the baby ring tail appeared to have its head in the pouch continuously and was sucking. To my amazement when I checked the pouch again the adult female had developed 2 teats and milk, she was wet nursing the baby ringtail!!!!!!

Slowly the adult ringtail is slowly regaining the use of her legs she can walk and climb up my curtains, although still has trouble climbing back down. The baby is 130 grams and growing daily and enjoys a top up feed with Wombaroo occasionally.

If anyone has had this type of success before I would love to hear from them The remarkable pair are a joy and a delight and this is what makes the effort that one puts in so rewarding for the possums and for me. Unfortunately I can't keep my hand off them but the physio therapy must continue.

#### **VET ETIQUETTE**

According to The Code of Practice, Care and Rehabilition of Orphaned, Sick or injured protected Animals by Wildlife Care Volunteers, 1 1.10, "all animals coming into care must be examined by a Veterinary surgeon as a matter of urgency to establish whether they are suitable for rehabilitation".

Fauna Rescue relies heavily on the goodwill of our vets, please be considerate when asking the vet for assistance, the following suggestions will make it easier both for carer and the vet.

- Always make an appointment before going.
- Be on time for your appointment, and ring them if you are going to be unavoidably late.
- Where possible make day time appointments.
- Do not contact after hours unless the vet has specifically asked you to or it is an emergency. Our local Vets work on a roster system after hours, so listen carefully to the message and contact the recommended Vet on duty.
- Take your current membership card when going for a con sultation, as proof that you are a financial member of Fauna Rescue.
- Always have your wildlife contained (this also applies to your domestic animals).
- Where necessary take gloves, towels etc if they are needed when holding the fauna for the vet's examination.
- Heed your vets professional advice. They have had years of training and experience.
- If you do not understand the instructions given, please ask for further explanations
- Concession rates for your domestic animals are not available through Fauna Rescue.
- Before commencing on a course of treatment ask the vet how much it will cost. It is preferred that
  you pay the Vet bill on attendance. If it is more than you can afford, check with the a committee
  member as help with vet bills may be available depending on funds available. If this situation does
  arise you will need to send the bill to our treasurer, along with details of the animal and treatment
  given. The bill will then be considered at the next committee meeting.
- Depending on where you live, some vets will charge only for drugs etc, while other vets will charge a concession consultation fee.
- Inform the vet of the outcome, especially if it is an unusual case.
- A few vets are not experienced with wildlife and prefer not to deal with them.
- Ask other members or a coordinator in your area which vets they use, or ring your local vet to find out if they are interested in wildlife care.

(d) Koala (Phascolarctos cinereus); (e) Raptors (Order Strigiformes and Families Accipitridae and Falconidae);

(f) Reptiles (excluding Order Testudines, Family Gechonidae, Scincidae, Varanidae);

(g) Platypus (Ornithorhynchus anatinus); and

(h) Bats (Order Chiroptera).

The licencee must notify QPWS as soon as practicable and within 24 hours of taking possession of any **B2** species of protected wildlife listed in Schedule 1 [presumed extinct] or Schedule 2 [endangered] of the Nature Conservation (Wildlife) Regulation 1994.

Members may only handle bats if they are currently vaccinated against Lyssavirus. All members **B3** vaccination details must be forwarded to QPWS Whitsunday District Office.

#### The Environment and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999

promotes the conservation of threatened species and biodiversity.

Under this Act, there are six different categories of threatened species:

**Extinct** - there is no reasonable doubt that the last member of the species has died.

**Extinct in wild** - the species is known only to survive in cultivation, in captivity or as a naturalised population well outside its past range.

**Critically endangered** - the species is facing an extremely high risk of extinction in the wild in the immediate future.

**Endangered** - the species is not critically endangered but it is facing a very high risk of extinction in the wild in the near future.

**Vulnerable** - the species is not critically endangered but it is facing a very high fisk of extinction in the wild in the medium-term future.

**Conservation dependant** - the species is the focus of a specific conservation program without which the species would become vulnerable, endangered or critically endangered within a period of five years.

## The Nature Conservation Act Status (NCA) lists the following classifications:

Presumed Extinct, Endangered, Vulnerable, Rare, Common or Not Protected.
