# TOURISTS, A RED TAILED BLACK COCKATOO AND A KOOKABURRA TO BOOT

In care with Leigh Skead January 2010

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> January Di phoned, a traveller had rescued a black cockatoo off a barbwire fence along the Hydeaway Bay Rd and closer to Proserpine rescued a kookaburra on the side of the road.

I collected both from them in Proserpine and brought them home knowing the cockatoo had 3inches (75mm) of barb wire still in her wing. Mark the vet at Orchid Rd was on duty he said most barbed wire cases were entwined in the skin and rarely further damage. The challenge was in determining which way to twist the wire so it can out and did not do any further damage and that the bird had a bigger chance of hurting us than we of hurting the bird.

My husband held her. Thanks to Ann Fowler for her holding technique it has made life easier. He also operated the wire cutters as he is stronger than I and high tensile wire requires strength. The wound did not have dried blood around it so I hoped she had not been on the fence long. I had the delightful job of determining the twist of the wire and slowly entwining it. Once this was achieved we assessed the wound to determine the extent of the damage and squirted nonstinging iodine on the wound. I gave her antibiotics in her water for five days and balanced this out with syringe filled with 'Vetafarm poly-aid plus' a few times per day. Poly-aid is fantastic for sick and injured birds and animals as it has protein, carbohydrates, vitamins & minerals & probiotics. I also offered her food – parrot mix and Chionanthus ramifloris or native olive fruit. This is a large tree with dark green leaves, the fruit looks like olives but when ripe are purple to black and yummy.

Di had arrived prior to the 'operation' and being the prepared lady she is brought with are large plastic storage box with holes cut in the lid. This proved to be great for both daily wound management and the bird being confined to rest the wing. During the warmer part of the day I put a fan on to ensure she did not become hot. Even though the space was confined she did not chew on the box.

After a few days I transferred her to a small aviary to climb chew and talk. Her entire body seems to be sore, and I would love to give a soft massage, maybe next week I will get brave enough.

She now is in a larger aviary with perches, branches of the native olive to chew, plus a tray of native olive fruit, figs, and umbrella cheese tree fruit (not ripe yet) and parrot seed. Twice her family or friends have visited and hopefully in a week or two when she is ready to go they will visit again.

The male Black tailed cockatoo are exactly that whereas the girls have yellow speckles on the head, neck and shoulders and the undertail coverts are barred black and red as opposed to a solid red colour.

**HELP** - If anybody can supply me with food that you know black cockatoos eat I would really appreciate giving her a change of diet.

Jacqui says they eat beach almonds and cassarina, various berries including Alexandria and solitaire palms. Plus, from research, bloodwood species *Corymbia polycarpa* (pink bloodwood) and *C. intermedia*. Cockatoos bite off branchlets with clusters of seed capsules, then hold them with their feet while chewing and harvesting seeds before littering the ground with debris. Among other seeds and nuts consumed are those of *Acacia*, *Allocasuarina*, *Banksia*, *Grevillea* and *Hakea*, as well as berries, fruits and various insects and grubs. Cockatoos have adapted to eating some introduced plants such as the doublegee (*Emex australis*). There is some evidence of consumption of wild radish (*Raphanus raphanistrum*), wild turnip (*Brassica tourneforti*) and melon (*Citrullus* or *Cucumis*)

Hi all



# ERADICATING CANE TOADS



Mr Burey a southwest Queensland meat processor is negotiating with licensing bodies both here and in China with export and import requirements. Toad's are highly prized in Chinese medicine and the meat is also eaten in some parts of the country. Our Toads may end up on a dinner plate in Asia. Wow how great it would be if we had collection points across Australia and help rid our bush of these insect eating beasties. They are ugly, poisonous, and kill untold numbers of native animals every year.

Mr Burey says if the deal goes ahead it could be a solution to Queensland's biggest pest problem. "Initial thoughts are a bit like collecting aluminium cans - anyone can go out and collect them and lob them off at our collecting points and we would come around in our trucks and pick them up after that," he said.

B/fwd page 6 "But instead of sausage sizzles and charity drives, pie drives that sort of stuff - they could do a toad drive."

All sounds good for the future but for the present here is the best way to rid yourself of toads. Please do not advocate putting toads directly into the freezer! This is extremely painful as the animal's cells will burst as they freeze (ask anyone who has suffered extreme frostbite what it feels like).

The method agreed on as the most appropriate for cane toads is called "Stepped hypothermia" and should be done as follows:

- 1 Place the toad in a secure container (e.g. ice-cream container), with some moist leaf litter in the bottom for them to hide in
- 2 Put the container in the FRIDGE for at least 4 hours or until the toad is fully asleep/dormant we conducted a pinch test on a hind toe to check for a response just to be sure—
- some days it took up to 10 hours for them to become unresponsive due to changing fridge temps and numbers of toads per container. I do mine overnight just to make sure.
- 3 once the toads are fully asleep (i.e. not responsive) they can then go into the freezer for at least 48 hours at minus 20 degree celsius (if the temp or time prescription is not followed they can still wake up how I don't know!)

By far the easiest way to deal with toads is to remove the spawn *before* they hatch into toadpoles. Toad spawn is very distinctive and not so easily confused with frog spawn – there is plenty of info & piccies on the net (see links below). At the onset of breeding season, if you listen out for the mating call (see third link) particularly on rainy nights and then go looking for the spawn – *it must be removed within 48 hours of being laid*.

The best thing is no euthanasia issues - because they are just eggs you can simply place in a garbage bag in the bin. Some people will say that you can also leave spawn on the grass to dry out but the eggs are toxic so there is the issue of animals potentially eating them and becoming poisoned. The bin is the better option.

# RARE & THREATENED IN THE WHITSUNDAYS

Beach stone-curlew or Beach thick-knee Esacus neglectus

Description: The Beach stone-curlew is a very large thick-set funds \$3,700.01) wader that is readily distinguished from all other waders by its large sixe, massive bill with yellow patched at the base, and bold black and white pattern on the head. Adults have a large head, uptilted bill, hunched profile, stout legs and thick 'Knees" the upper part of the body is predominately grev-brown with distinctive black and white patterning on the face, shoulder and secondary wings. The throat and breast are a paler grey-brown, the belly and wings are white with some black on the tips of the wings. The large bill is yellow at the base and black at the tip. Beach stone-

Diet: They forage on large intertidal mudflats, sandflats, sandbanks and sandpits exposed at low tide for crabs and other marine invertebrates.

curlews have a large yellow eye and a broad black eye

patch, with white bands above and below it.

Beach stone-curlews breed from September and February. Typically one egg is laid per season but a second may be laid monthly and the annual figures will be compiled at the end if the first is lost. Both parents care for the hatchling who remains dependant on them for 7 to 12 months. During the night, breeding beach stone-curlews use a harsh, wailing territorial call which is higher pitched, harsher and less fluty than that of the bush stone-curlew. When alarmed, the species may vocalise with a weal yapping.


